VENN DIAGRAM ACTIVITY


Students actively participated in an activity where they used their knowledge of different regions and found the similarities and differences of the same through a Venn Diagram activity.

The concept of recombination of 'alleles' which leads to variation was reinforced by means of this activity.

Students of Middle School and High School visited the Pali-Khopoli Forganic Farm. which practises organic farming of paddy, fruits and various types of medicinal plants. At the farm, students were first about the oriented benefits of organic farming. Students were given information about various plants with special benefits and compost preparation.
